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Tips for ESL or Foreign Language Teaching in the Elementary Classroom

School Zone has some excellent resources for primary Spanish-speaking students and/or for the teaching of Spanish as a foreign language in the elementary classroom. Whether you have non-English speaking PK-2 students in your regular class or your school has bilingual classes, School Zone workbooks in Spanish are excellent tools. Several of the concepts/books could be used equally by English or Spanish speaking children. The difference is only in the directions. For example, if using any of the following Los Colores (Colors), Contando del 1 al 10 (Counting 1 -10), or Igual o Diferente (Same or Different) children could be doing the same activity with directions in their native language and exposure to the written word in their native A great idea language. would be to give a copy of

both workbook pages to become familiar with the similarities and differences in the two languages.

There are two other books which are particular favorites of Alfabeto: mine, Eland Mayusculas Alfabeto: Minusculas. These books on alphabet, upper lower case respectively, have pictures whose "Spanish" word are the basis for matching the beginning sound. still evaluates a student's understanding beginning sounds, but



also gives them a chance to use words that are meaningful to them and includes three Spanish letters not identified in the English alphabet.

Any of the five books published by School Zone could also be a great resource for the regular elementary class up through (even middle school) which includes the teaching of a foreign language, i.e., Spanish. The simple but fun format should make them favorites for elementary students. School Zone publishes boxed games, flash cards, game cards, and puzzle cards in Japanese. Teaching about Women in History

Distinguished Women in History written by Valerie Vos and published by Frank Schaffer provides information and activities dealing with twenty-six women. Virtually all of the women are Americans, with the exception of Mother Teresa, Margaret Thatcher, and Queen Victoria. The women were selected based on their contributions in various fields including politics, music, dance, sports, science, exploration, and humanitarianism.

The book has a self-contained unit for each of the women including a one page

biography, two reproducible pages of related student activities, and a page devoted to potential research questions and resources. The book is geared for middle and upper grade students, but could be adapted higher or lower as needed.

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

Could you use access to over two hundred school related phrases in communicating with Spanish Speaking Parents?

An excellent resource for schools is Teachers' Messages for Report Cards: **English-Spanish** Edition published by Fearon Teacher Aids. It is a small, information filled book designed to help non-Spanish speaking teachers communicate Spanish-speaking with parents/guardians about common school problems. It is organized around chapters dealing with such concerns as weak work; behavior, personality, and playground problems; social, attitude, and selfe s t e e m changes; attendance and tardiness

problems; slow, average, gifted, and new students; and end-of-the-year messages. There are two hundred thirty-six messages, one hundred fifty-eight phrases, and additional fourteen adjectives all listed in both English and Spanish. you are interested in reviewing the book or in picking up a Fearon Catalog stop by the MRC.
